We began this week with an assembly on how we can stay safe online. In school we use the acronym, *SMART*, to help remind us how to navigate the World Wide Web safely.

#### Stay SMART in the Online World

- **\$** is for Safe e.g., use strong passwords, use a user name, don't give our personal information and use avatars to protect your personal identity
- M is for Meet a reminder that online friends we don't know in person, are still strangers
- A is for Accepting e.g., don't open email attachments if you are unsure of the sender, don't click on pop-ups, don't accept friend requests from people you don't know
- R is for Reliable e.g., don't just rely on information from one web page, check several, ask a trusted adult, look in a book, watch out for fake news
- T is for Tell we use this in all areas of safeguarding tell a trusted adult if you are worried, a reminder that cyber-bullying is very unkind and to take screen shots and save messages if people are posting anything mean – and don't do mean things back

On <u>Childnet</u> there is a lovely child-friendly cartoon video we use in school to help demonstrate SMART. Well worth sharing with your child at home.

Tuesday, 7<sup>th</sup> February, is <u>Safer Internet Day</u>. Teachers will be working with children in class on this theme. Check out this video from our Digital Leaders telling you more about the day which is themed around, **Want to talk about it?** 

#### **Online Gaming Concerns**

In education there are growing concerns about children's increasing exposure to highly inappropriate content when gaming with friends online. We hear from children themselves, colleagues and parents about playing games that are age-rated much older than the child. These games encourage and reward violence, often with frequent swearing from other gamers. We feel these factors are increasingly influencing children to be more aggressive and less respectful in schools and society as a whole.

Please can I bring your attention to the PEGI age rating for games. This criteria has been established by experts in the field of child protection, psychology, the law and media. Games are classified into the following age groups based on the content: 3, 7, 12, 16 or 18.

Here are some of the games we hear children talk about playing that are rated older than their age:

- Grand Theft Auto (rated 18) graphic violence, violence against vulnerable and defenceless characters, swearing, drugs, alcohol, nudity – rewards achieved for violence and criminality
- Call of Duty (rated 18) graphic violence, violence against vulnerable and defenceless characters and strong language
- Fortnight (rated 12) frequent scenes of mild violence

### **Uniform Reminder**



At St Margaret's Academy we encourage our children to take pride in themselves and in their work. We need you to help us with this by making sure your child is wearing the correct uniform. Below is a quick reminder;

- Black Shoes; flat soles with grip or plain simple black boots during the winter months No sandals or open toe shoes
- Grey trousers, grey tailored shorts, grey pinafore or grey skirt
- White polo shirt (with or without logo) or white shirt with collar
- Purple sweatshirt or cardigan with school logo
- Plain black, grey or white socks; plain grey tights
- Long enough hair must be tied back
- Make-up, nail varnish (including false nails) or transfer tattoos are not acceptable in school

On your child's day for PE, please do remember that they need to come into school wearing school PE kit, **not their own sports clothes.** 

- Trainers (coloured allowed) or plimsolls for dance and gym (barefoot otherwise)
- Plain black PE shorts, black leggings or black tracksuit bottoms

- Optional purple PE hoodie for cold outdoor PE or School Jumper
