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# Spring Term Newsletter No.3 (25.1.19)

It has been another enjoyable week for me at St Margaret's. I've been visiting more classes again this week with members of the Senior Leadership Team to look at teaching and learning. It has been great to see more excellent teaching and to see how well your children respond to the learning. Children enjoy their lessons and work hard to make improvements. I've shown various visitors round the school and they too always comment on the positive culture of behaviour and learning.

Staff also enjoy learning. In discussions about teaching, they are reflective and forward thinking. This week teachers have attended two training meetings after school: one to look at how to challenge the more able writers and one to look at Maths (how to support the mathematicians who need to catch up and how best to teach times tables). On Wednesday evening we had a Senior Leadership Team meeting to look at future school improvements which was joined by the Chair of Governors, Jonathan Dickson.

There is an amazing group of teaching assistants who are all committed to the school and children. In the modern culture of education so much more is expected of our support staff. Without the advantage of teacher training, they are expected to teach and make sure children make progress. Long gone are the days of only putting up displays and sharpening pencils. We have a talented group at St Margaret's. Thank you to them for their commitment and skills.

I've realised that the children benefit from a range of clubs. For the younger ones, there is a Yoga Club and Loomband Club with others already planned. For the older ones there is Girls Football, Spanish, Healthy 60, Netball, Gymnastics, Lego, Alternative Sports, Boys Football, Tag Rugby, Tri-Golf, Choir and Combined Football. These clubs are all free and almost all run by members of staff who volunteer their time. Thank you very much to the staff who go the extra mile to provide these opportunities.

I've spent some time this week getting to know the educational landscape of Torbay which is different in many ways to Devon. It's interesting to see how individual schools are used as areas of expertise and support for others, like St Margaret's does with our Hearing Support Centre. There are some exciting plans to use this model to help support schools with challenges around behaviour. I had a short tour of Children's Services today which helped me understand how different services connect to each other. It has been good to meet some other Heads and people from Torbay who offer support to schools. I look forward to finding out more and navigating my way around these new systems.



# **Shanghai Maths!**

Mr Rogers reports...

I'm not very good at maths. I prefer reading and writing, but I'm useless at mathematics! It's alright, don't worry.

I'm sure this is a conversation (or parts of) that many of us have had with either our children, or other adults, over the years. Indeed, if I had a pound for every time I've heard this during my career, I would be a moderately wealthy man! Personally, I've always found this quite odd. Seldom would one admit to being poor at reading or writing, but for some reason it is acceptable to be poor at maths. In some circumstances, it is even considered 'cool'.

On Monday, Mrs Rice and I were privileged to observe a pair of teachers from Shanghai teach two lessons. We observed a Year 4 & Year 6 class of approximately 30 children at Shiphay Learning Academy. This observation was part of the 2 Year NCETM (National Centre for Excellence in Maths Teaching) Programme, which we joined in September 2018.

The teaching of mathematics in Shanghai is quite different to what we would consider 'typical' teaching in the UK. First of all, most Shanghai schools have upwards of 40 children in a class – in some cases 50 is the norm. The children all work on the same problem, exploring the process of achieving the answer, rather than just jumping straight to the answer itself. The correct use of an appropriate manipulative (Unifix cubes, Cuisenaire Rods, number line etc.) is also a huge part of the lesson, geared towards helping to build concrete understanding of a problem. Each element builds on the previous and there is always a reason behind it, even down to where the teacher records a method or part of the problem on their white board. Our own teaching works on small steps, but it was certainly interesting to see the differences.

There are elements of this style that we have already embedded in our classroom practice; however, on the whole, it is a very a different approach to what we do in the UK. Lessons at St. Margaret's have varying levels of challenge, pitched for a range of abilities and greater opportunities to develop mathematical thinking through reasoning skills, something which didn't take as high a precedent in the two lessons we observed.

One thing we did take away was the need to continue to adapt and develop rapid fluency knowledge of multiplication and linked division facts, number bonds and quick recall of mental and written methods for all four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) with the children across the school.

In China, children are expected, on entry to school, to know multiplication facts up to 9x9 and a raft of number bonds. We already have introduced a number of key ways to address this in school, the first being the adoption of KIRFs (Key Instant Recall Facts), which are not only taught in school, but issued as home learning and both Club 54 in KS1 and 108 Club for our KS2 children.

Over the coming school year, we look forwards to taking the best elements of Shanghai practice and implementing it at St. Margaret's. We are launching a brand new initiative for learning multiplication and division facts at home very shortly, with further information to follow!
