Replace the sleeve inside an old DVD case with a piece of plain, white paper, then let your child use a dry wipe pen to make marks to their heart's content on the outside of the DVD case. You can even store items such as dry wipe pens and mark-making cards within the case.

Squirt some shaving foam into a bowl, give your child a paintbrush and let them paint the bath or shower wall during bathtime.

Mark Making

UseYourHands Washthe Windows

Many children adore finger-painting or making handprints - just give them some paint and paper and let them explore! This is a little messy, despite its name! Fill a bowl with soapy water and give your child a sponge or brushes to wash the windows - brilliant for mark making and developing their motor skills.



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Drawing or painting on vertical surfaces is brilliant for young children's shoulder strength and mobility. If you need a quick outdoor mark-making activity, let your child paint with water on a wall, fence or tree trunk.

-Chunky Chalks

Use chunky chalks indoors or outdoors - just giving your child a different mark-making tool than usual can be a big enough change in their activity to engage them!

Twinkl Top Tip:

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Try both wet and dry chalk - your child will get completely different mark-making experiences.

Play a nursery rhyme through your phone and experiment with making marks that go with the lyrics, e.g. draw big lines going up, down and side to side as you listen to 'The Grand Old Duke of York'.

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Stamp, Stamp, Stamp

Your child doesn't need to be drawing to mark make. Pressing or stamping objects into modelling dough to make marks is a great way for young children to experience making marks. Use anything you like - lids, stamps, toy car tyres, natural objects, utensils, etc.
