<u>Where do Muslims ger guidance from?</u>

- The Qur'an the most important. Received by Prophet Muhammad from Angel Jibril, memorised by him and his companions, then written down and collected into 114 surahs (divisions/chapters).
- Sunnah: second most important source of authority. It means 'customs' or 'practices' and refers to the actions of Muhammad.
 These represent model behaviour for Muslims, and they try to imitate the life of Muhammad.
- Hadith: these are collections of the words of Muhammad. There are different collections of hadith, and some are seen as more reliable than others.

Key Beliefs

Muslims believe that there is only one God called Allah. They believe Allah is the only ruler of the universe. The word 'Islam' means submission and obedience to Allah. Muhammad is so highly respected by Muclime that they will say "peace be upon him" after his name is spoken.

The	Six Main Beliefs	The Five Pillars of Islam
1.	Belief in <mark>Allah</mark> as the one and only God.	As well as the six main beliefs, there are Five Pillars of Islam.
	Belief in angels. Belief in the holy books.	Shahadah: Muslims say a declaration of faith.
	Belief in the prophets and that Muhammad was the final prophet.	Salah: Muslims pray five times a day. Before prayer, they must wash themselves and then face Mecca whilst praying. Zakat: Muslims must donate to charities.
5.	Belief in the Day of Judgement (the day when <mark>Allah</mark> decides if a person goes to heaven or hell).	Sawm: Muslims fast for one month during a time called Ramadan.
6.	Belief in predestination (the belief that <mark>Allah</mark> has already planned out what will happen).	Hajj: Muslims have to travel to Mccca once in their lifetime, if they can afford to.



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
