Songs we have sung this week

In Foundation Stage we LOVE music and singing as it plays such an important role in early childhood development. Here are some reasons why we think singing is so important:

Building their vocabulary by hearing and learning new words.

Strengthening respiratory muscles and optimising breathing.

Finger rhymes and songs are great for developing the fine muscle movements in fingers.

Being able to recall what they have heard in the right sequence – an important early skill for reading and writing. Exposure to grammar, sentence construction and word order.

Building knowledge of the world with thematic songs.

Feeling good! Singing releases endorphins which is good for health and happiness.

> Developing listening and concentration skills as they tune into the sounds and words.

Hearing sounds and sound patterns in words e.g. rhyme and alliteration. Building their knowledge of the different parts of speech e.g. adjectives and verbs.

Learning new concepts such as counting.

Memory skills are developed as they learn to listen to all the words and remember what they have heard.

> Big movement songs help to build body coordination, strength and control.

Building confidence and a sense of selfidentity and selfexpression.

Next week we will introduce the pictures and words the children will need in order to go on to learn the letters b, f, e, l (boot, flower, egg, legs).

We will shortly begin teaching your children the sound that each letter of the alphabet makes and the shape of the corresponding letter. They will learn one letter a day.

When saying each sound, we ensure we pronounce it in its purest form i.e. we say 'mmm' not 'muh', 'sss' not 'suh' and 't' not 'tuh'. This can take a little practise! Practised counting out I, 2, 3 or 4 objects into pots.

Shown the numbers 1, 2, 3 or 4 in different ways using their fingers.

Begun to learn to see and recognise how many dots in a set without counting – we call this 'subitising.'
