

The Three Little Pigs!


This week the children have enjoyed listening to and retelling the story of 'The Three Little Pigs.' In this tale there is a repeated pattern of language which the children quickly spotted and joined in with.

We talked about the characters in the story and in particular the bad character of the big, bad wolf! In our writing sessions this week the children have had lots of fun thinking of their own 'big' and 'bad' character and gave super descriptions of their actions e.g. The big bad witch who turned people into frogs. We learnt the red word 'the' (this is a word that we cannot Fred Talk and we just have to remember it) and we then had a go at using it to write a short phrase 'the big bad..... We tried hard to Fred Talk our words and even started to use some finger spaces to make sure our words didn't bump into each other! Here is some of our super writing:










Maths

One of the most popular areas in our provision is the Small World play area where children can use a range of miniature objects and materials to create their own story and real-life scenes. This play is wonderful for language building; whilst thinking imaginatively, they are talking out loud, listening to their friends and exploring or building new vocabulary. As we move through the term, we are adding enhancements to this area to enable the children to re-tell the stories they have heard or innovate stories of their own.

Read Write In

Why not have a go at creating a small world at home with your child. Below are some images of simple ideas you can use to ignite play. You may have some small toys and objects already which you can use such as play people, toy cars, farm or zoo animals and building bricks. Your child could create their own settings or buildings using recycled objects such as cereal boxes, kitchen roll tubes, milk bottle lids or scraps of fabric. Finally, our natural world provides some wonderful resources for miniature play e.g. a leafy branch becomes a tree, small pebbles become rocky mountains, pathways and dens can be made with twigs
